In accordance with Sections 7, 8 and 9 of the Freedom of Information Act (FOIA) 1999, the Caribbean Industrial Research Institute (CARIRI), is required by law to publish the following statements, which is an explanation of the role and responsibility of CARIRI and the categories of documents held by CARIRI. The Act gives the public right of access (with exemptions) to official documents held by the Caribbean Industrial Research Institute.

Section 7 STATEMENTS

Section 7 (1) (a) (i)

THE FUNCTIONS AND STRUCTURE OF THE CARIBBEAN INDUSTRIAL RESEARCH INSTITUTE

The Caribbean Industrial Research Institute (CARIRI) was established by an Act of Parliament by the Government of Trinidad and Tobago in 1970 with assistance from the United Nations Development Programme (UNDP) and the United Nations Industrial Development Organization (UNIDO). The Institute is wholly owned by the Government of Trinidad and Tobago and provides technological services to private and public sector organizations locally and regionally.

The Institute's mission is: "To advance the economic and social development of Trinidad and Tobago and other countries in the Caribbean Region by providing technical and technological support, creating and transferring technology to the producers of goods and services and maintaining a positive work environment that encourages employee commitment to the financial viability and success of the organization."

The Institute's major functions include:

- To provide technical and industrial services to public and private industrial enterprises;
- To collect and disseminate technical information, including applicable standards, specifications and quality control procedures;
- ◆ To undertake chemical analytical work particularly in connection with quality control testing in the food industries and other local industries;
- To provide physical (measurements) and materials testing services;
- ◆ To provide engineering services, including assistance with establishing production lines, prototype designs, and maintenance and repair problems;
- To undertake economic and technical feasibility studies, including marketing surveys, with a view to identifying bankable projects;

- ◆ To provide environmental monitoring, control and developmental activities.
- ◆ To advise the government on the formulation of specifications, the promulgation and application of industrial processes and practices and the preparation of industrial standards;
- To engage in industrial research programmes related to the needs of Trinidad and Tobago and the Caribbean region.

The Board of Directors is appointed by the President, the Republic of Trinidad and Tobago, and controls the overall direction of the Institute. CARIRI employs a workforce of approximately one hundred and ten (110) persons and is headed by a Chief Executive Officer.

OPERATIONAL UNITS AND DEPARTMENTS

The Caribbean Industrial Research Institute operates from two (2) locations - UWI Campus, St. Augustine and Trincity West Industrial Estate, Macoya. The key focus areas are:

- Food and Biotechnology
- Microbiology
- Analytical Chemistry
- Petroleum and Energy
- Industrial Materials
- Environmental Management

CARIRI is comprised of the following Units as shown in the Organizational Chart

- Petroleum and Energy-based Services (PEBS)
- Analytical Chemistry and Microbiology Services (ACAMS)
- Environmental Services (ES)
- Food/Biotechnology Services (Biotech)
- Industrial Material Unit (IMU)
- Business Services Unit (BSU)

Analytical Chemistry and Microbiology Services (ACAMS)

This Unit provides industry and the population at large with a wide range of testing and consultancy services:

- Analytical Chemistry Laboratory
- Nutritional labeling
- Potable water assessment, involving spring, well, bottled and treated public supplies
- Pharmaceuticals re compliance
- Chemicals re conformance to specified requirements
- Environmental contaminants to e.g. pesticides
- Toxicology
- Air Monitoring
- Food Safety
- Food and Potable water re fitness for human consumption
- Effluent both industrial and from domestic wastewater treatment plants in compliance with TTS 547 and 417 respectively
- Biodegradability
- Identification and quantification of microbial strains which have specific implications in air and water quality
- Pesticide identification

Biotechnology

There continues to be a pressing need to tap the vast potential in the agroprocessing sector. The main area of focus is therefore to provide general and laboratory based technology application/implementation to the food and agricultural sectors together with consultation on specific problems.

The areas concerned include:

- Product and process development
- Plant and quality audits
- Feasibility studies technical and economic and plant layout
- Troubleshooting process plant operations
- Development and implementation of Quality Assurance programme
- Provision of technical assistance to entrepreneurs and small and medium scale processors in the agro-processing sectors
- Training in food preservation techniques and wine making from local raw materials
- Food safety
- Contract processing in Pilot Plant

- In-plant diagnostics aimed at improving food safety and food quality in food establishments
- Sensory analysis and Consumer research
- Licensing of technology
- Raw material assessment
- Post-harvest technology
- Cleaner Production technologies
 - waste generation baseline (plant optimization)
 - development of processes and systems to minimize waste

Business Services

The responsibilities of the Business Services Unit are as follows:

- Promotion of the Institute's services to existing and potential clients;
- Identification of new business opportunities;
- Conduct of market research including competitor evaluation;
- Customer relations:
- Development (in conjunction with other Units / Departments) of new products;
- Preparation of proposals and review of proposals and contracts;

Environmental Services

There is a great demand for specialized environmental services both in an advisory capacity as well as for use by the regulatory agencies. The main focus of this Unit continues to be the provision of a range of environmental management services, including testing and consultancy services to industry and the general public. Amongst the areas of focus are:-

- Indoor and Ambient Air Quality including:
 - preliminary site assessment
 - diagnostic audits/initial measurement surveys of pollutants and environmental stressors
 - remediation consulting services
 - development and implementation of an Indoor Air Quality (IAQ) management program
 - stack testing

- Environmental Engineering Consulting, including:
 - waste management
 - environmental impact assessment (EIA)
- Environmental Management Cleaner Environment
 - consulting services in the implementation of clean technologies
- Sewerage Treatment Plants
 - effluent monitoring at hotels and public systems
 - water quality in streams

Industrial Materials Unit

This Unit provides a number of services to the construction and heavy industries and serves a wide range of client from micro to large. Their objectives include solving their materials technological problems and quality related issues by providing the under mentioned services:

- Cube works
 - accredited testing of concrete products, aggregates, asphalt and asphalt concrete, etc.
- Metallurgy
 - mechanized testing, metallography analysis of engineering factors, weld assessment and includes qualification and experimental heat treatment

Procedure to be followed when accessing a document from the Caribbean Industrial Research Institute

Applicants may request information via telephone, e-mail or in person. However, in order to access the rights afforded under the FOIA, the request must be made in writing on the official form Request for access to Official Documents, for information not available in the public domain. These forms would be made available to applicants.

Requests must be addressed to the Designated Officer of CARIRI named in section 7 (1) (a) (vi)

The request must be accompanied by enough detail to facilitate locating the relevant document/s as efficiently as possible. In keeping with the provisions of the FOIA, the Designated Officer would render any assistance necessary in order to formulate the request.

If the requested documents are not those held by CARIRI, the applicant is advised to direct the request to the relevant authority.

The time frame for delivery of a document, if it exists or can be found, is established under the FOIA. If CARIRI fails to meet these deadlines, the FOIA gives applicants the right to proceed as if the request had been denied. CARIRI will diligently try to comply with the time limits, but if it appears that processing a request may take longer than the statutory limit, an applicant's request will be acknowledged and the applicant will be advised of its status. Since there is a possibility that requests may be incorrectly addressed or misrouted, an applicant may wish to call or write to confirm that the request has been received and to ascertain its status.

CARIRI will determine whether to grant your request for access to information as soon as practicable, but **no later than 30 days**, as required by Section 15 of the FOIA. If a decision is taken to grant access to the information requested, applicants will be permitted to inspect the documents or be provided with copies, if so requested, and upon payment of the relevant fees.

The FOIA Fees and Charges Regulations prescribe fees related to the search, retrieval and provision of documents. The documents will be delivered to applicants within seven days of receipt of payment of the relevant fee. The FOIA allows applicants a refund of fees paid, in addition to the requested information, if CARIRI fails to provide the information within the seven-day period.

In respect of any documents requiring an additional level of approval, the Chief Executive Officer would make the decision.
